

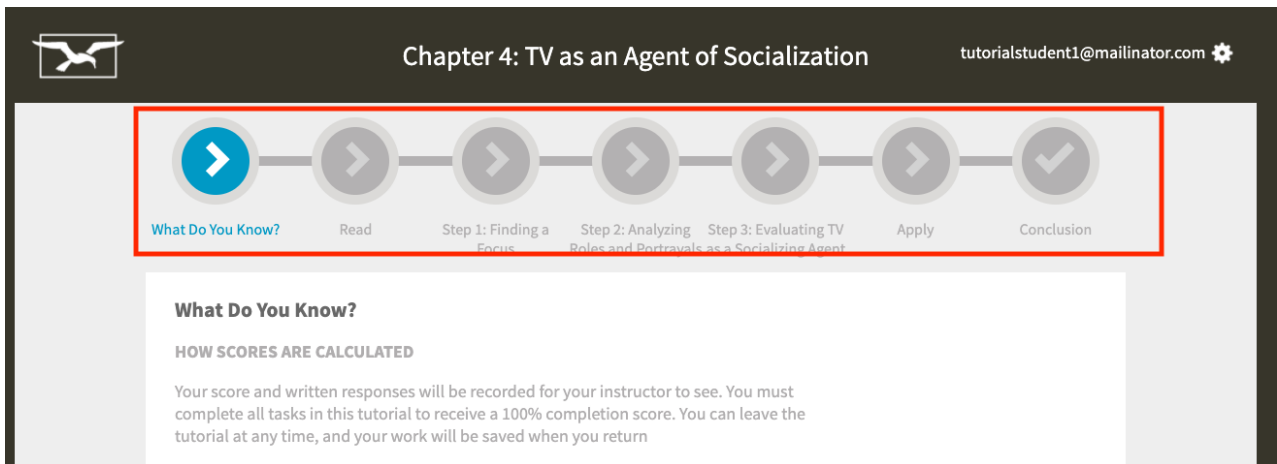
# How do I complete Tutorials?

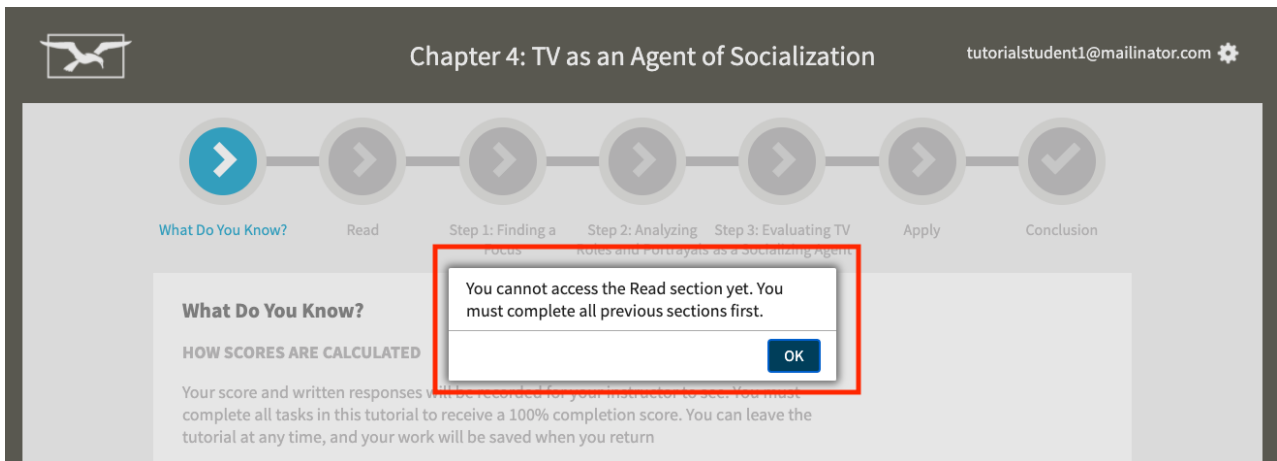
To complete Tutorial activities and receive a grade, you must answer every question available, but you do not have to get them all correct on your first attempt.

The system will guide you through a series of sections that you must complete in order. The system will not let you move forward to the next section in the activity until you have answered all questions in that section.

Sections in the navigation bar will turn blue once they have been completed. Sections you have not started will be gray.



If you try to move on without answering all questions in a section, you will receive this message.



After you complete a section, the continue button will appear at the bottom of the screen.

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Look for recurrent themes in a text, image, or media messages. Analyze variables and the relationships among them.

Define the sociological terms that will define the subject of the study. Conduct fieldwork and take careful notes.

Researchers first identify specific variables or themes in an existing source, and then analyze the meaning of them.

A **status** is a position in a social hierarchy that comes with a set of expectations. A master status is one that is always relevant and affects all other statuses we possess. Thus, master statuses are particularly prone to **stereotyping**, when people make assumptions about what a person is like, based on a characteristic viewed as predominant.
